Martin Luther King, Jr.

Next Monday is the national holiday known is "Martin Luther King Day." Or more accurately "Martin Luther King Jr. Day," since he was given the same complete name as his father. But why was he given his own national holiday? Is it somehow akin to, say, Memorial Day, or Labor Day, or Independence Day? Is his importance on par with someone like Christopher Columbus and George Washington, who also have national holidays recognizing their birth? Does Martin Luther King Jr. Day have the same religious significance as Christmas?

Perhaps we could say that no single individual in U.S. history has done more for more people than MLK. Or that more individuals in the U.S. today would list him as one of their "heroes."

I would list him as one of my heroes—if for no other reason than that he exemplifies what it means to live a truly Christ-like life. Someone who sought to live according to God's will, rather than his own will (as we say every time we pray the Lord's Prayer). Someone who was willing to give up his own life in the process.

Country singer Kathy Mattea recorded a stunningly beautiful song she wrote called "Beautiful Fool." Here are the lyrics:
